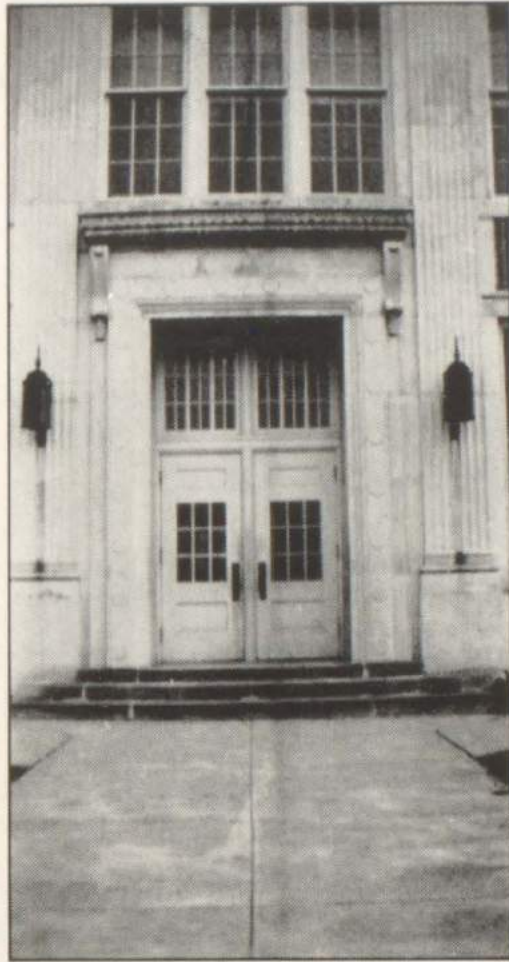

SENIORS' HIGHLIGHTS

The lowliest of classes is the Freshman Class but we didn't feel lowly at all when we entered Brighton High School in the fall of '38 and elected "Bob" Phillips as president, Sherrel Howard as vice-president, "Bob" Singer as secretary, and Majel Crout as treasurer, and Miss Mary Kulish (Mrs. Pearsall) as class advisor. Green and white were selected for our class colors and the white rose for our flower. We had a couple of parties and then sat back to wait until our Sophomore year to really get busy.

Busy is right! With Leland Dean as our class advisor, "Bob" Phillips as president, "Bob" Garland as vice-president, "Rosie" Miller as secretary, and "Bob" Pelkey as treasurer, we conducted a Queen of the Yearbook Contest to find the most popular girl in B. H. S. To secure votes we sold pencils, hair ribbons, and subscriptions for the Brightonian. During this time we veered away from our money-making long enough to have one party. We climaxed this eventful year by publishing the Brightonian.

In our Junior year our class officers were "Don" Carney, president, Sherrel Howard, vice-president; Rosemary Miller, secretary; "Bob" Pelkey, treasurer, and Dean Naldrett, class advisor. After much time and effort we presented the play "Aunt Tillie Goes To Town" just before Christmas. And it was another big day for us when our class rings arrived. The annual J-Hop, which we presented for the Class of 1941, had as its theme a Moonlit Garden. We finished out the year with a skating party and a bake sale.

The Piratical Seniors was what we were called in our last year of school for we induced people to buy candy, hot dogs, pop, victory pins, Christmas wreaths, pencils, and class pins. Dean Naldrett was again our class advisor, and the class officers were: Richard Leitz, president; Donald Carney, vice-president; Helen Geer, secretary, and "Bill" Hodge, treasurer. After a few parties we presented "The Imaginary Invalid" in the spring of '42. The quotation "If we rest, we rust" was chosen as our class motto. Instead of the trip to Washington that the Senior Class usually takes, we took a boat trip. We finished our high school career by again publishing the Brightonian.

The Student Council was organized at the beginning of the school year. Besides the officers it is composed of the president and one representative from each class.
