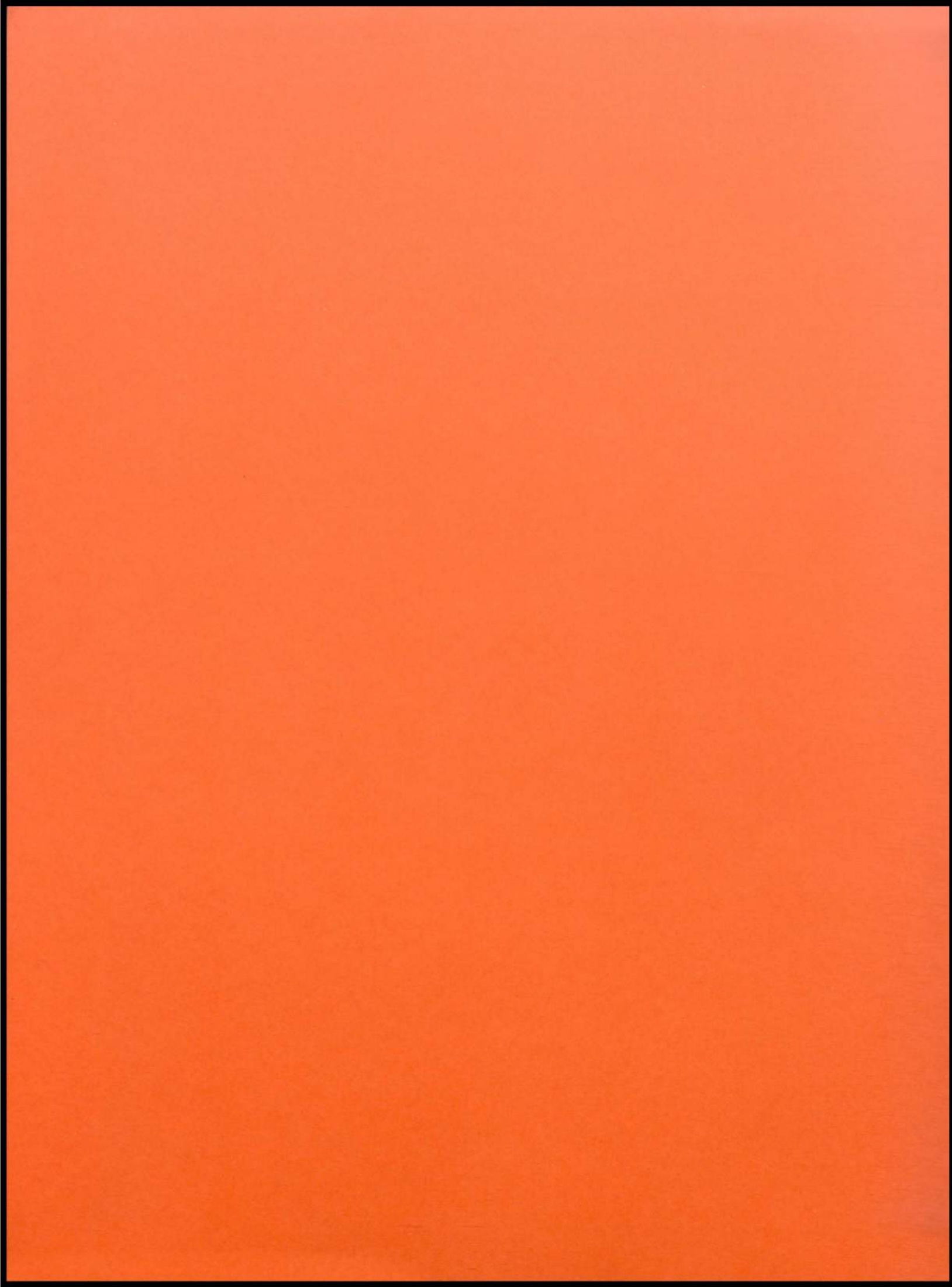

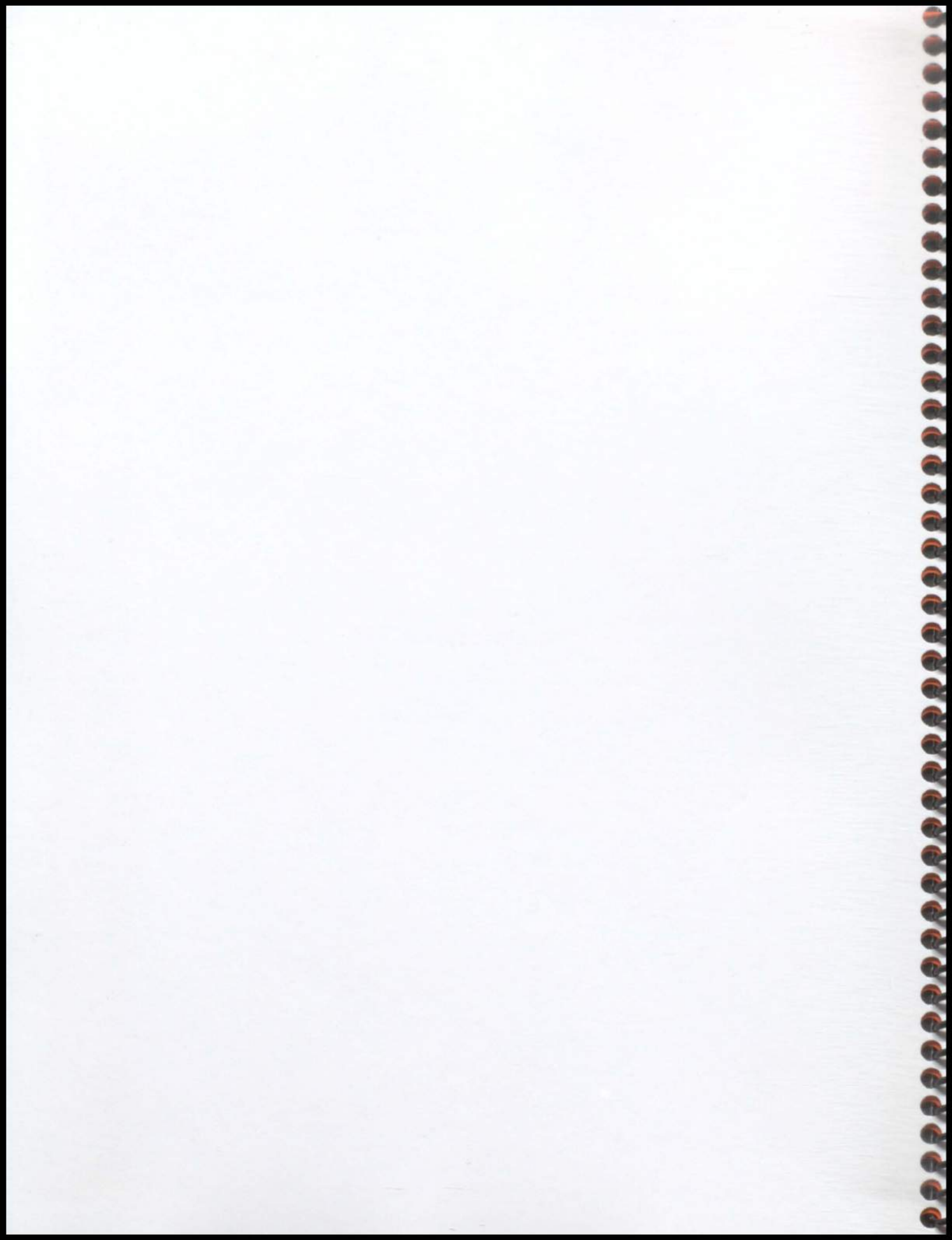
EDITORIAL

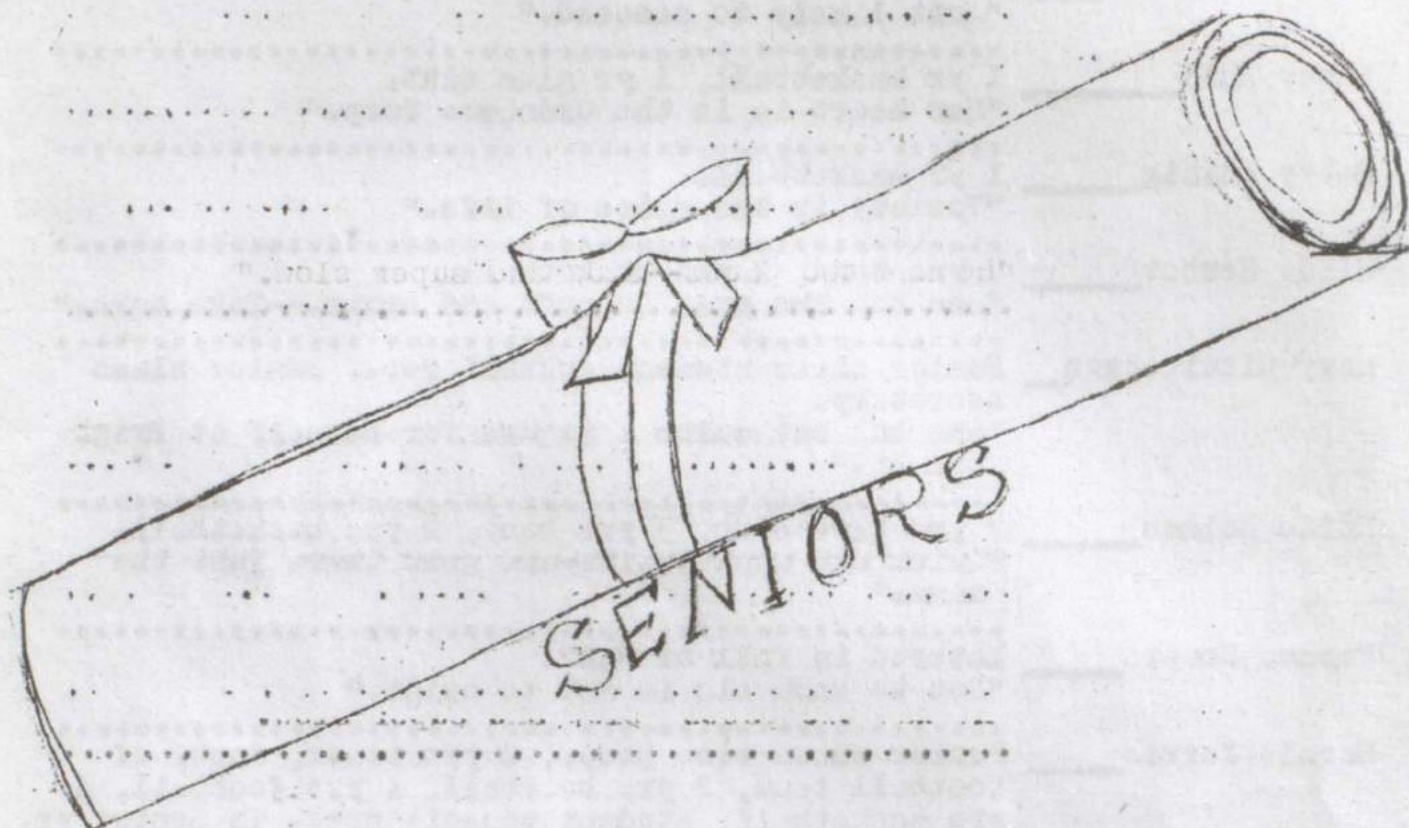
We realize that mistakes have been made, but we were conscious of them and tried to make each succeeding issue better.

THE GRADUATES OF "43"

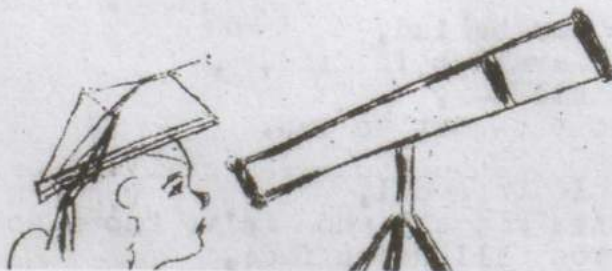
Four years have passed and now we face,

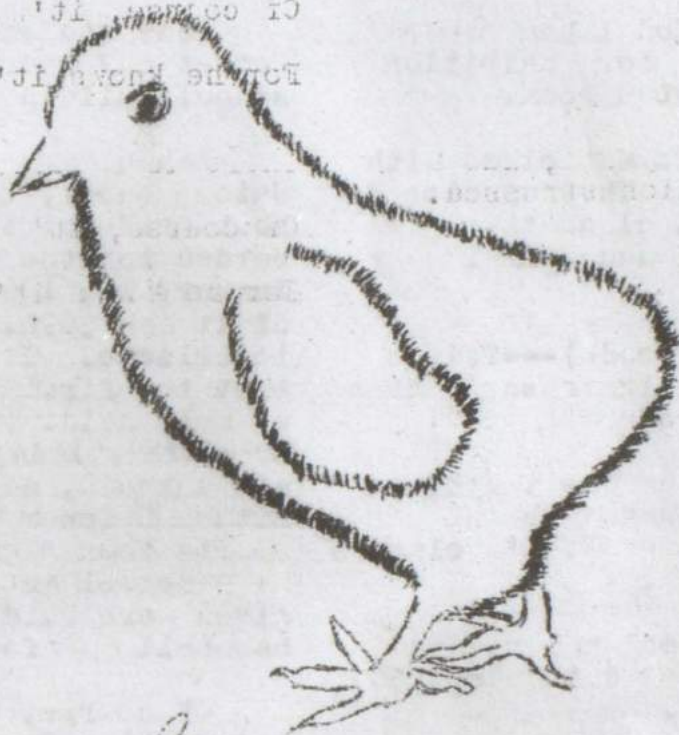

B. H. S. Begins 1367

Home Living--- Model homes were made and will be for exhibition in the kindergarten room.

Speech---It was a new class with twelve students. They sponsored an assembly. In class they give skits, speeches, and choral readings.

Government (8th grade)---Trials were given on a bigger scale than in the past years.

Cyril Folk dancing was taught. High school girls have been taking over Cyril's classes since her absence.

Typing---Type school papers and increase their speed to about 50 words per minute.

Home ec. II 1st semester--cooking 2nd semester 3 garments were made by each student.

Manual Art---It is not given this year due to lack of instructors.

History--Current events and quizzes were given.

American Literature --An original short story was required of each student.

Cafeteria--One credit or a half credit is given according to the number of hours worked.

Kindergarten--The teacher made silhouettes of pupils. A rhythm band organized.

Shorthand---Last semester they are typing shorthand and increasing speed.

Journalism---One credit is given. Not books were read. Published school papers. Trips were taken to Detroit Times, Argus office, and the printing office.

Many students would probably wonder why and when the first school building was built.

School was first held in the Union School, located on the south side of town. The deed recorded for the property was dated January 10, 1367. Also the value of it was \$696.50, which is hard to believe. It wasn't until 1833 that the first graduation exercises were held. The class consisted of two members, whose names are unknown, according to records. Although fewer subjects were given sports took a great part in the high school activities. The sports given were outdoor basketball, baseball and football.

Of course, there are a few interesting facts about our school which we labor in from day to day. It was built in 1923, with P. L. Bell as superintendent of it. The growth of the graduation classes varied down through the years. In 1927 the graduation class consisted of seven members; 1937, twenty-three members, and 1942 thirty-three members. Who knows maybe at the end of the next five years there will be forty-four students in the graduation class.
