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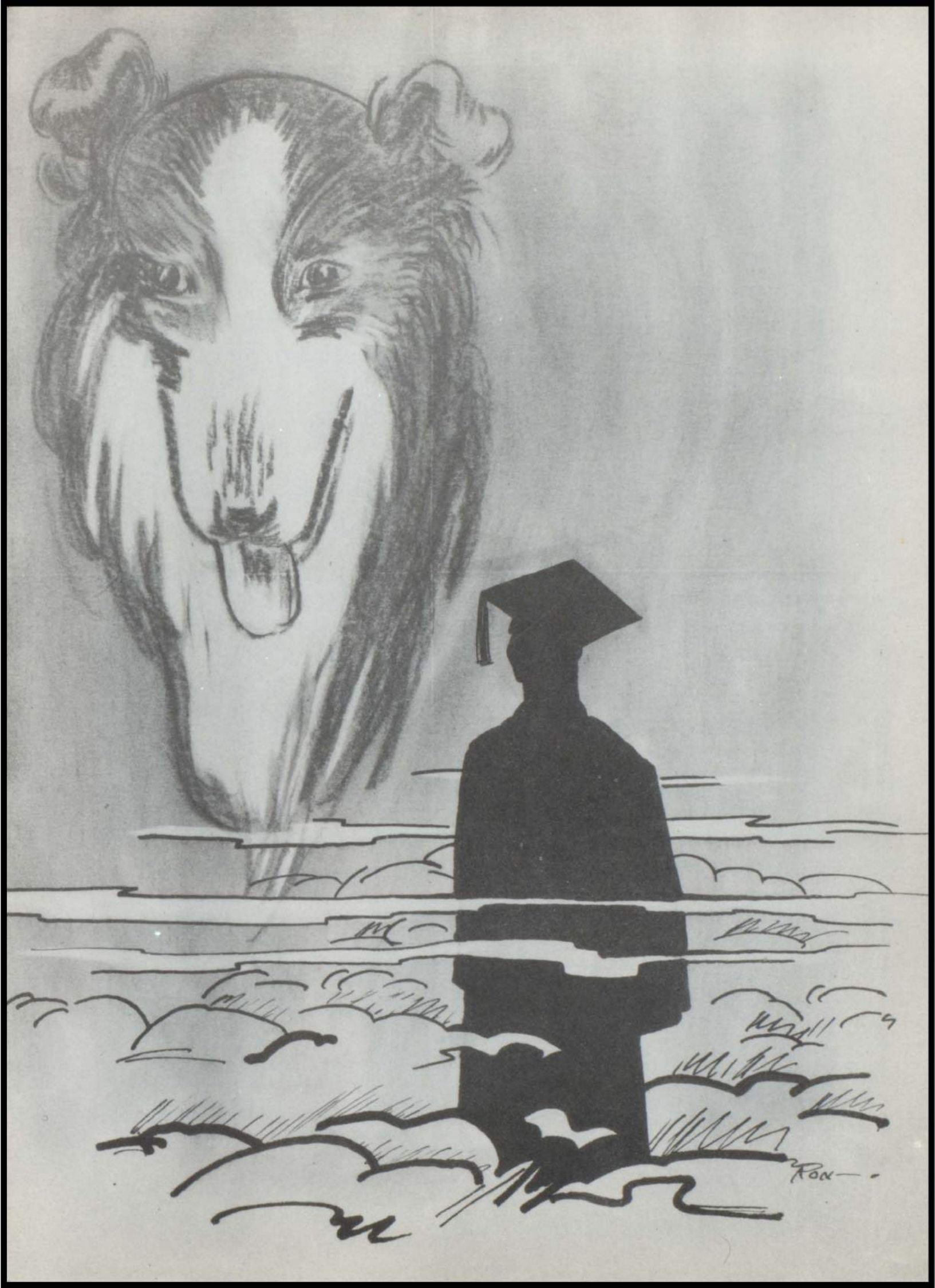

Again the task of selecting officers was set before us. 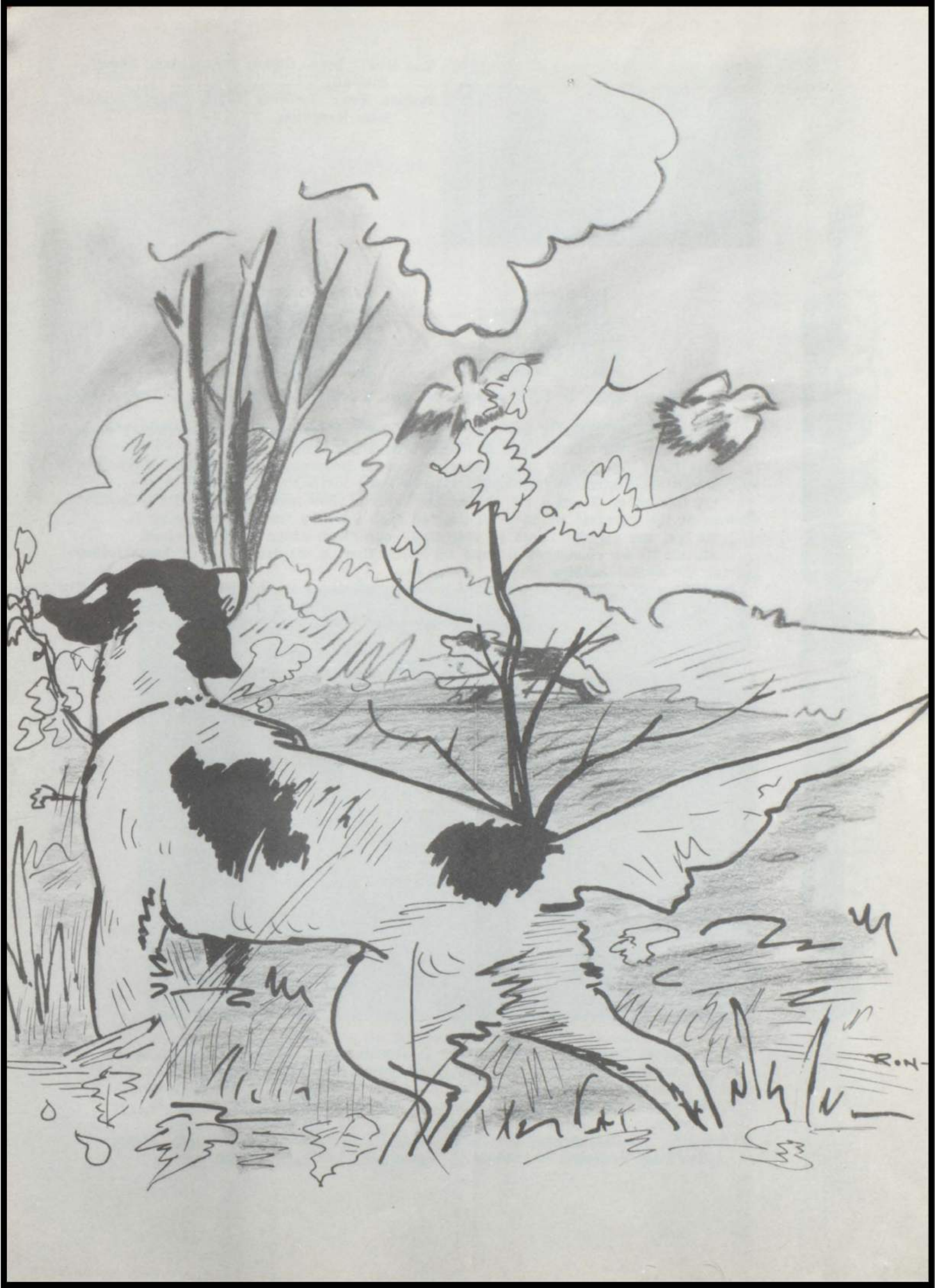

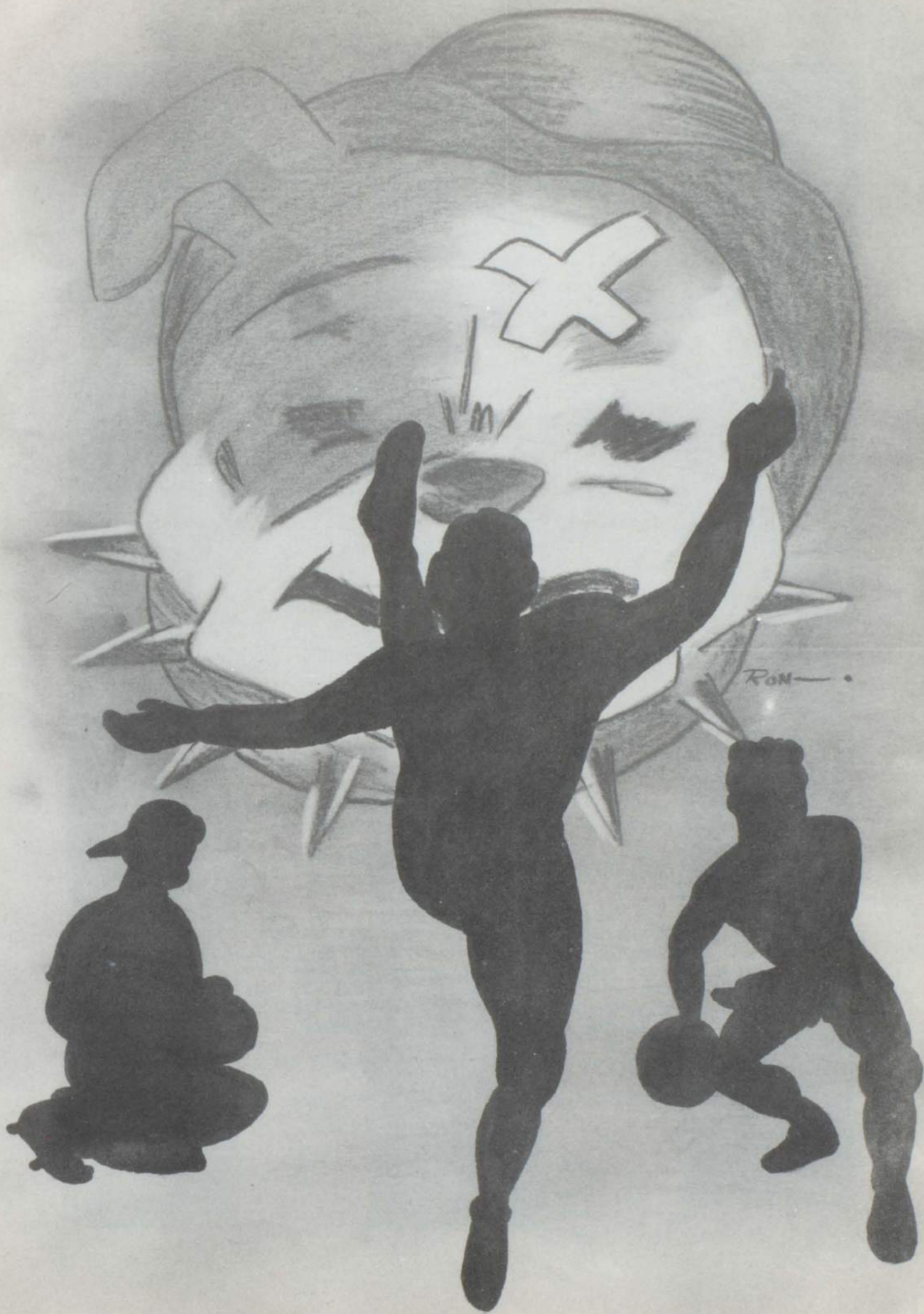

The pitchers were many, but the two starting pitchers were Jim Anderson and Harry Wisser.

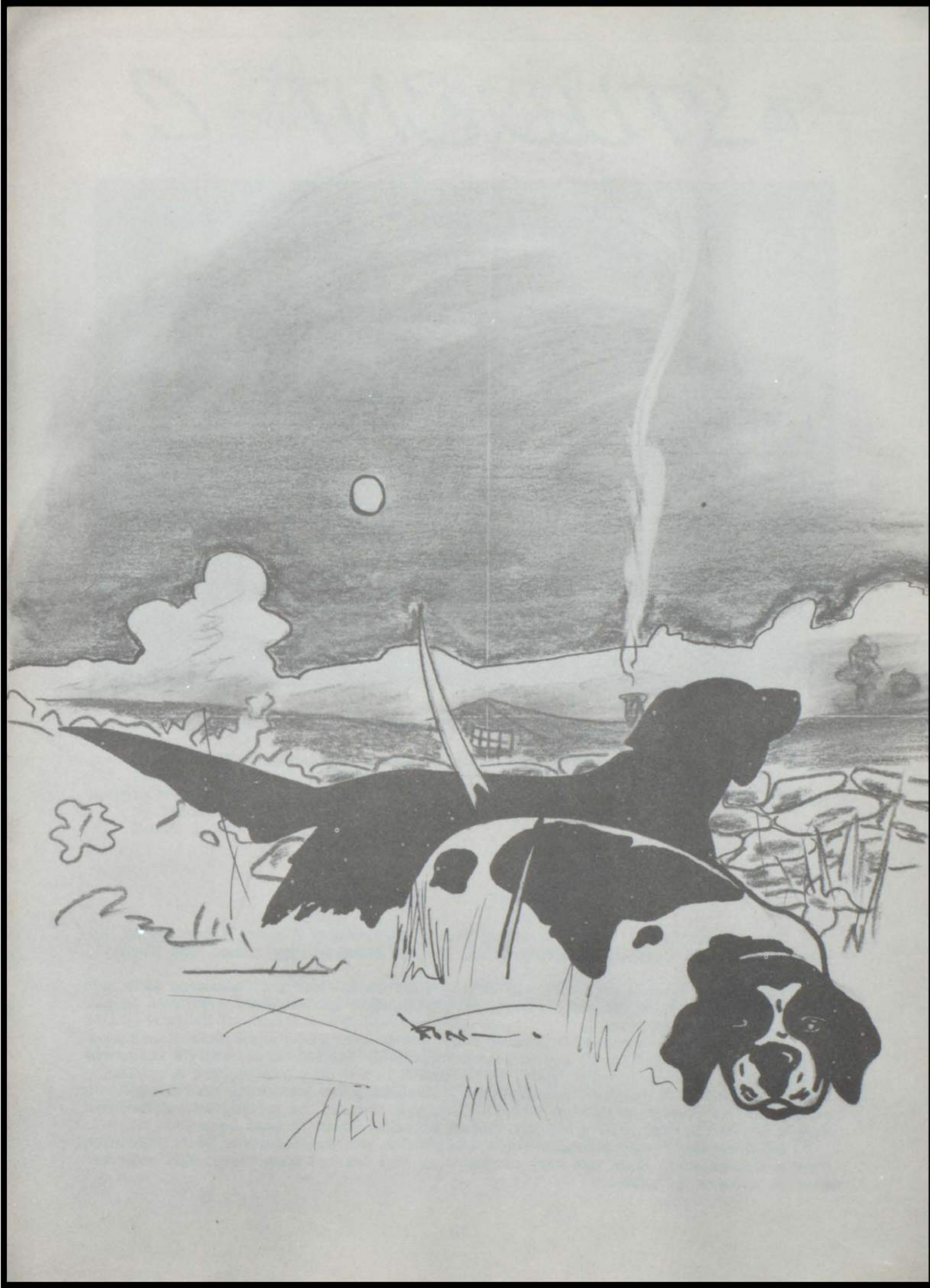

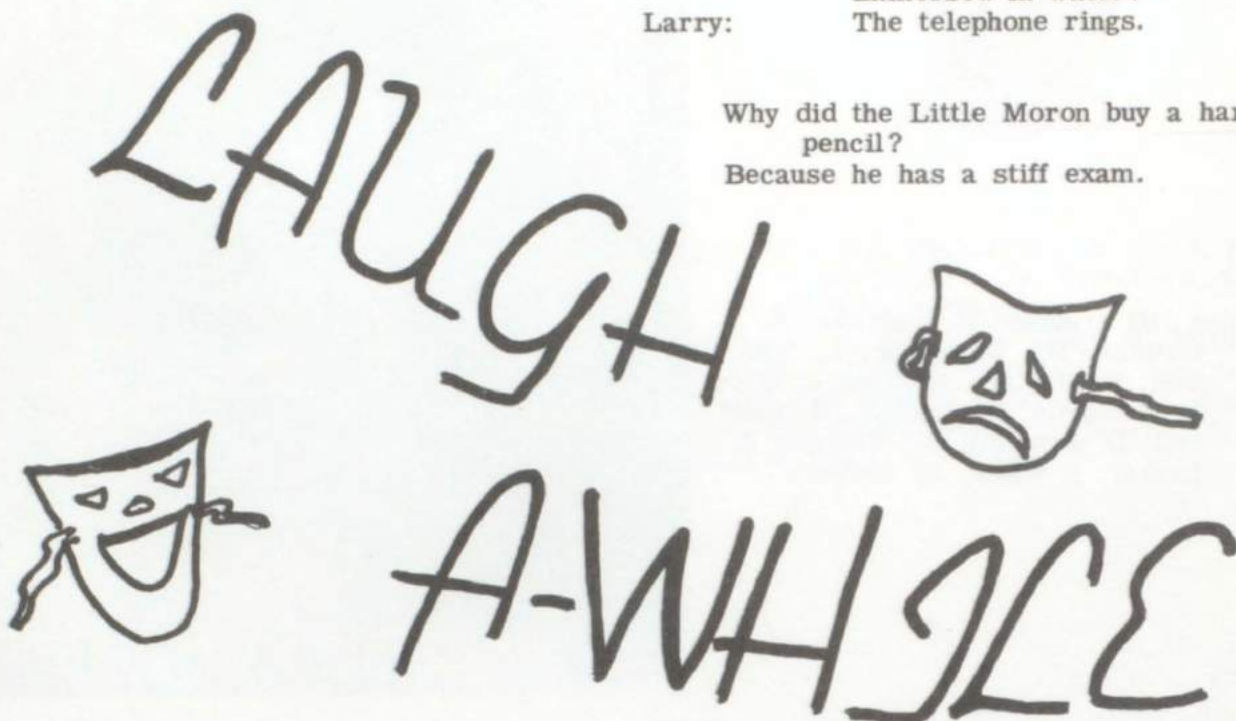
