We shared in the Variety show and refreshments with the Seniors. In February our rings finally came. There was a gleam in everyone's eye as well as on their hands. March 10 was our money-making project date. We sponsored a magician show featuring "Rew, The Magician." The greatest dance of the year, the J-HOP, was held May 29, 1950 at Walden-woods. A very enjoyable time was had by all who attended. Brian Greely and Barbara Hill were honored as king and queen. On "Skip Day" we left early in the morning from the school and headed for the Detroit Zoo. We spent the morning at the zoo. Although they almost caged some of us, we got under way for Pontiac after a picnic lunch. We then toured the Pontiac State Hospital. With this the class of "51" ended their Junior year.

We finally became full-fledged Seniors. With 46 members, we held a class meeting for the purpose of electing officers. We elected president, Chuck Bidwell; vice-president, Jess Lebow; secretary, Marie Ryan; treasurer, Ginger Baugher; and a student council representative, Bill Kennedy. During the course of the year, we sold book covers and pencils. Our Senior pictures were taken in October. The traditional Carnival was given on November 18. Our part in this was the selling of refreshments, make-up booth, a dance and half of the turkey raffle. Also, we displayed baby pictures of the Seniors which everyone enjoyed. On December 21, we sponsored the "Holiday Ball," which was gaily decorated for the Christmas spirit. This was a huge success. Next on the agenda came the ordering of our caps and gowns. This and the selection of our announcements were big events. Along came the question of where to go on the Senior trip. After a long discussion it was finally decided to go to Washington, D. C. With this out of the way, we planned to have a class party on February 13. It was a pot luck dinner with various forms of entertainment following. When May 1 rolled around, we had a Senior-Parent banquet. At last Monday, May 21, came and we were bound for Washington, D. C. Once there and settled we started off on our various tours to see all the wonders of our national capital. After five exciting days, we returned to Brighton, tired but happy. Baccalaureate services were held at the Lutheran church, June 3rd. Commencement was held at eight o'clock on June 7, at Sloan Memorial Field. That night we achieved our long awaited goal-----and received our diplomas.

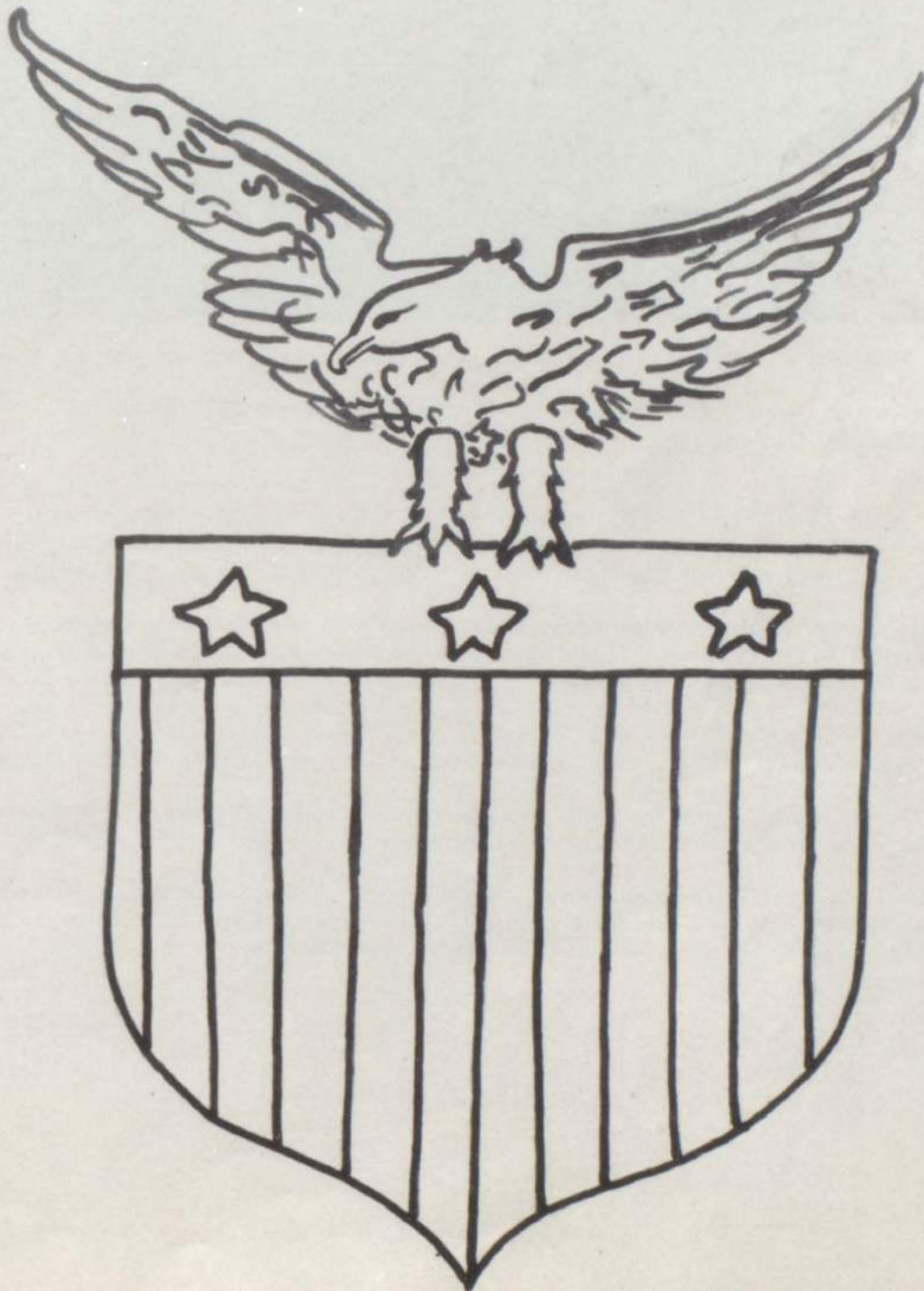
