Challenging one of the strongest schedules ever attempted by a Brighton eleven, the Bulldogs faced such top ranking Class B clubs as Niles, Eaton Rapids, and East Lansing. For the first time in six years they set off against an independent schedule which was the result of the transfer from the League of Lakes to the Wayne-Oakland County League, Beginning with the 1953 grid season the local eleven will compete in the active competition of the WOCL against such squads as Holly, Northville, Milford, Clarenceville, and Keego Harbor.

This year the Bulldogs were under the direction of Robert Scranton who changed the local attack to the popular " T " formation.

Dick Stonex and Larry Price were elected to serve the team as co-captains during the regular season.

A high point of this years grid season was the 180 mile road trip to Niles. Although the local eleven suffered a $2 G 0$ defeat they enjoyed the fine experience of an over night journey.

Due to the strong schedule the Bulldogs were only able to gain but two victories and two ties in nine contests. The two victories were a $20-0$ decision over Clarkston, in the homecoming attraction, and a 13-6 edge over their old rival the Hartland Eagles. ## Junior Varsity Football

A truly outstanding and promising football eleven was Coach John Kestner's Junior Varsity squad, who are more commonly referred to as the "Bullpups". In their first major active season, the Bullpups compiled a very successful seven won and one loss record.

The Bullpups, who engaged in arc duels on Tuesday evenings, like the Varsity eleven challenged a very strong and lengthy schedule.

The opening tilt on the Bullpups schedule was a $18-6$ victory over the Livonia Bentley eleven, and a tight $13-12$ sand bowl Keego Harbor decision was next on the Pups record. The following week the Brighton eleven produced their strongest offensive game of the season when they set back Holly 33-14. The lone Bullpup defeat was on October 14, when Boys' Republic won 20-6. Above is pictured the finest basketball squad ever sponsored by Brighton High School. This team, as headed by Coach Hy Klein, who was serving his second year in Brighton, gained the first undisputed League Championship and the first Michigan High School Athletic Association District Championship in Brighton's history.

Led by co-captains, Tom Evenson and Dick Stonex, the local five in their first year of competition in the Wayne-Oakland County League, managed to obtain the league title by winning eight of their ten games. The Bulldogs two losses were to Clarkston 54-51 and Northville 50-46 while they defeated Clarkston and Northville each once and also conquered Clarenceville, Holly, and Milford each twice. Four teams on two different occasions shared the league lead and it wasn't until late in the season that the Bulldogs managed to pull out in front.

In the state sponsored District Tournament, the Bulldogs, playing host to the annual attraction, defeated South Lyon, Dexter, and Hartland to claim a Class C D istrict Championship.

In non-league activities the local hoopsters gained but two victories in five games as they completed their season with 13 victories in 19 starts, including ten straight home decisions.

Chief among the local point getters was the outstanding All-State $6^{\prime} 3^{\prime \prime}$ center, Tom Evenson, who rolled up 314 points in 15 games to lead the Oakland-Pontiac area scorers with a 20.9 average, to become recognized by many coaches, sports writers, and officials as one of the state's leading five Class C players, gaining a first team berth on the all-state team selected by the Detroit News, Also among the Brighton scorers were Larry Price 127, Max Southwell 105, and Dick Stonex 100.

## Junior Varsity Basketball

The 1952-1953 Junior Varsity Basketball Squad, headed by Robert Scranton, lacked the experience of a winning five as they managed to gain but one decision in fifteen starts. The fact that no seniors were allowed to particpate in Junior Varsity activities also hindered winning possibilities. In a squad filled with freshmen, basketball fundamentals were a large part of Coach Scranton's teaching problems. These freshmen provide a bright basketball future for Brighton.

The Bullpups challenged the same schedule as the Varsity which included ten Class B opponents.

Al Theriault was the Bullpups high scorer of the season as he collected 104 points. Gerald Prieskorn rated second among the local five's point getters with his 56 points.

The Bullpups lone victory was a 35-31 decision over Hartland in their second tilt of the season. Al Theriault paced the team to this victory as he collected nine points.

In an attempt to promote basketball interest in Brighton, two Junior high teams and a freshmen team were organized. Playing Saturday morning games, the three quintets showed prospects for tomorrow's Varsity squad.
