## Class History

The fall of " 50 " found the class of " 54 " starting out on their journey as Freshman. Mrs. DeVine and Mrs. Wilson were our class advisors. Out of our 72 members we chose Dick Eastman, President; Wayne Atkinson, Vice-President; Marlene Odell, Secretary; Pat Herrmann, Treasurer; Sandra Pepper, Student Council Representative; and Marilyn Wilt, Alternate. We also chose the Yellow Rose as our class flower. "Make the best Better" was our Motto, and scarlet and grey, our class colors. Our first money making project was the Spook House at the Carnival. For our second money making project we sold fountain pens. On December 19, 1950 we held our first class party. We danced and passed out gifts. Our second class party was held on the night of Friday, the 6th of April. It was a skating party held at Island Lake Roller Rink.
To lead our class in the year of $51-52$ we chose Wayne Atkinson, President; Jerry Prieskorn, Vice-President; Marlene Odell, Secretary; Joan Daniells, Treasurer; and Jean White, Student Council Representative. Our class advisors were Mrs. Hicks, Mr. Klein and Mr. Anderson, The Sophomore-Parent Dinner was held on December 13, 1951 to discuss plans for the Camping Trip. On December 17th the class boarded a bus to travel to Cedar Lake Camp to spend a chilly week in the sticks. Our cl ass party took place on March 28th in our new gym. Reaching the half-way point in our high school career we looked back on many fond memories.
We entered our Junior year with many exciting things to look forward to. We first elected our class officers who were, Wayne Atkinson, President; Gene Baugher, Vice-President; Pat Herrmann, Secretary; Joan Daniells, Treasurer; Jenny Poppa, Student Council Representative. Our long awaited moment arrived when Mr. Terryberry came on November 6th and took orders for our class rings. In February we presented our Junior Class Play, "No Boys Allowed", directed by Mrs. Savery and Mr. Wall. Our one and only class party we decided should be different so we had a combined Junior-Senior party. We danced and later a hayride was enjoyed by all. Our next project was the Junior Banquet which proved to be very successful. Our second money making project was the selling of refreshments at the district tournaments. On April 8, our rings finally arrived. The rest of the day was spent showing off the rings. Many hours of planning went into our J-Hop. The "Colonial Ball" was the name given to the J-Hop. Walden Woods was the setting for this event on the night of April 25. On "Skip Day" we left early in the morning for Kensington Park. A picnic lunch was held and later everyone enjoyed boating, hiking, and a few brave ones took a quick dip. This brought to a climax our Junior year at Brighton High.
In September of " 53 " we started the final lap of our long journey. We elected as officers; June Hodgin, President; Wayne Atkinson, Vice- President; Suzanne Holden, Treasurer; and Pat Herrmann, Secretary. Our Student Council representatives were Jenny Poppa and Max Southwell. Selling refreshments at the football games wss our first money making project. Next was a magazine drive which was very successful. "I Remember Mama" was our Senior play, directed by Gerald Beckwith. We also sold refreshments at all of the home basketball games. On November 25 th a class meeting was held to decide on the color of our caps and gowns. White was our first choice with blue a close second. On January 7th the class met with Mr. Hawkins to choose our trip. Our first choice was the Baltimore \& Ohio trip which would take us to both Washington and New York. The Youth Travel Tours was the second choice. Our senior banquet was held on February 11th. A Representative from the Baltimore \& Ohio Trip explained the trip and showed a film. In May a party was held for the entire class at Burroughs Farms. Baccalaureate was May 30 and Commencement June 3rd.
