The cafeteria was supervised by Mrs. Gordon Hawkins, the Home Economics teacher, with Mrs. Nellie Kramm, Mrs. Mary Oliver, Mrs. Patricia Borst, and Miss Joan Kroczak as cooks.

The hot lunches prepared daily included a main dish, vegetable, salad, dessert, bread, butter, peanut butter, jelly, and milk. The total cost was $25 \varnothing$

At Thanksgiving a special full course turkey dinner was served for the same low price. Hot beef sandwiches, hot dogs, and sloppy joes were students' favorite foods.

Irene Spicer, Gloria Kroczak, Carol Cluckey, and Eddie Crowe spent one hour a day helping the cafeteria.

Due to the large number of students and teachers to be served, the noon hours were divided into three sections--7th and 8th grades at 11:20, 3rd to 6th grades at $11: 40$, and the senior high at $12: 20$. The number served daily varied from 275 to 300 .
