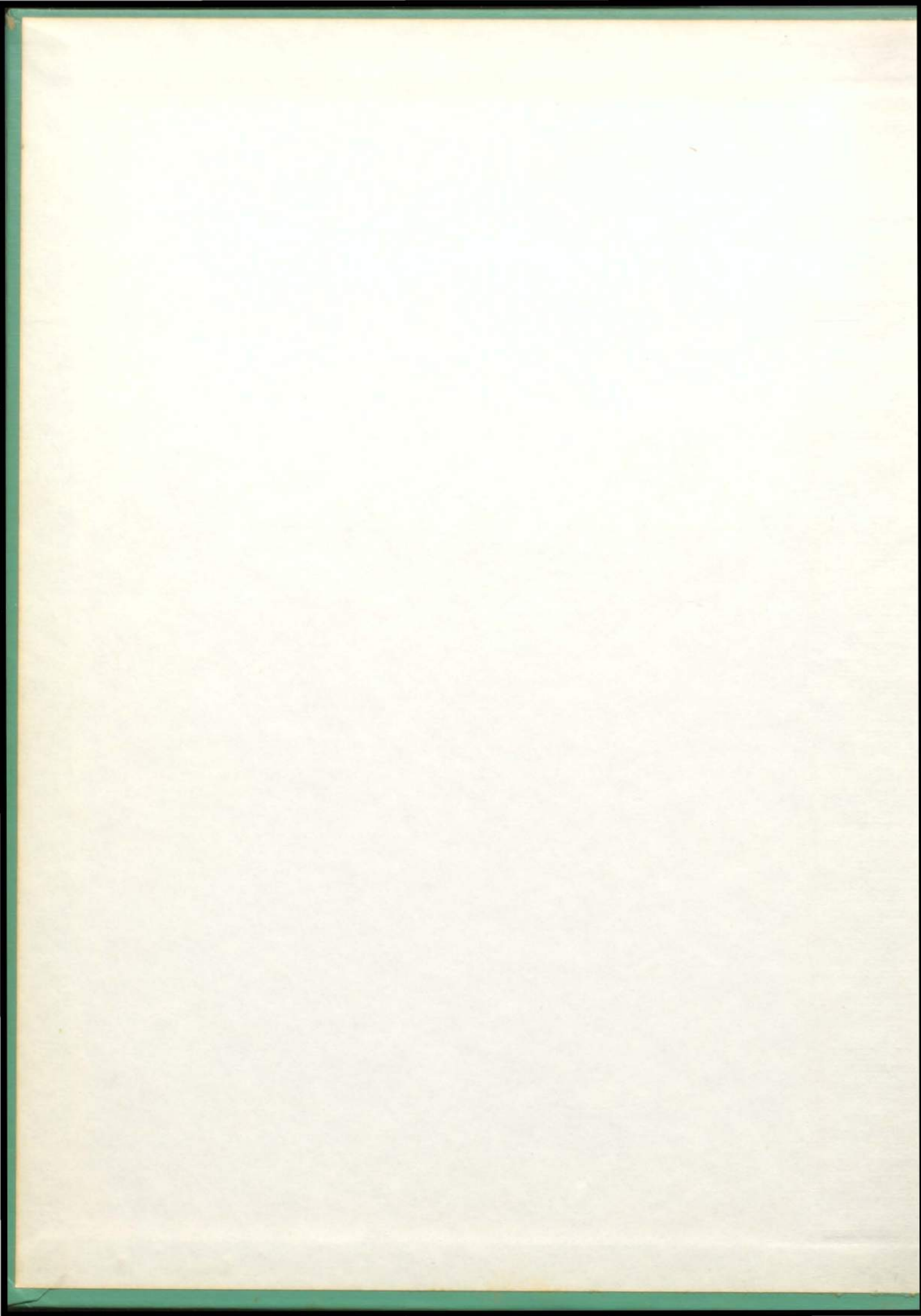

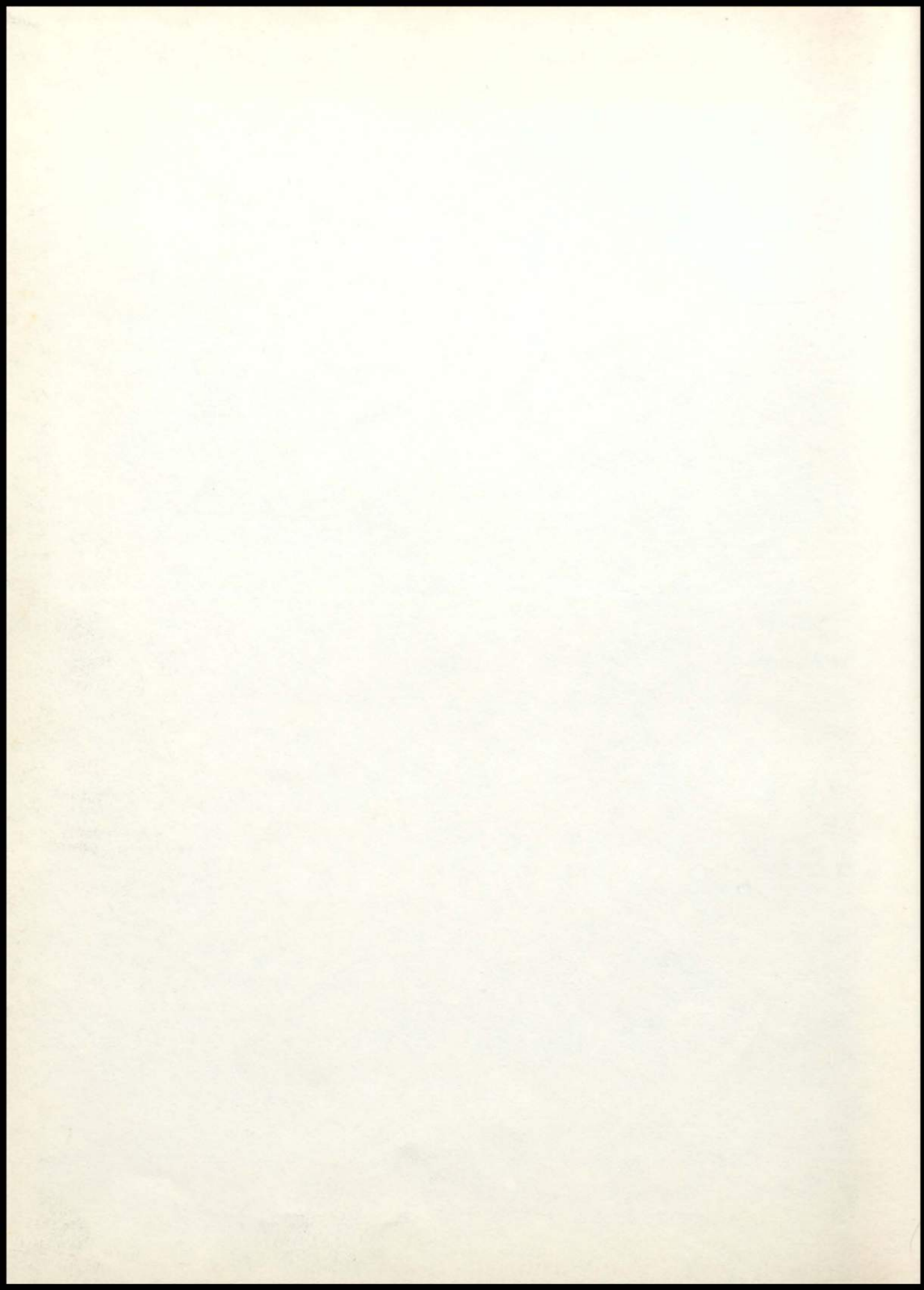

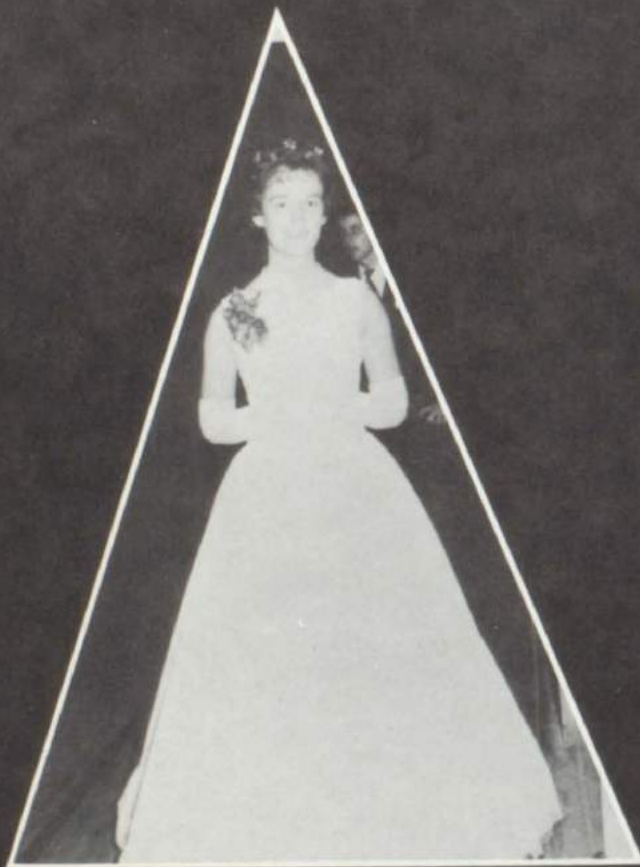

superintendent speaks to seniors



Superintendent Hawkins, in a message to the Senior Class, assesses the years which lie ahead of them.

The school district known as the Brighton Area Schools was organized in 1950 and finished its first ten years last June. The 1960-61 school year begins the second ten years, a period to be known as the 1960's.

During the 1960's you Seniors will be included among the 26 million new young workers launching their work careers. The young workers most severely handicapped going into the job market will be those lacking a high school diploma, because more and more employers are demanding high school graduation as a minimum requirement even for entry jobs. It is obvious that the competition for jobs will become stiffer in the years ahead as the need for unskilled labor shrinks.

Young workers during the 1960's will need more education and training, with better guidance and counseling as they prepare themselves for a rapidly-changing and more complex world.

In school you have learned to think and evaluate, and you have achieved a reasonable mastery of the fundamentals of education. How you meet the challenge of the 1960's is now your responsibility.

The Science program in Junior High consists of the following:

In Junior High, both the biological and physical sciences are taught. Some experiments in these courses are performed, but the most common means of instruction is by teacher demonstration and lecturing.

In Senior High, two years of Science are required for graduation. Biology is taken in the freshmen year where controlled live experiments and lab exercises are performed. Students study the major systems of both plants and animals.

Also required is physical science or an alternate in which chemistry, physics, geology, and astronomy are all studied.

Two additional years of science may be taken by studying chemistry and physics.

Chemistry involves the study of the composition of the earth and its make-up. The atom, families of elements, radioactive isotopes and alloys are all taken up.

Physics is the study of the relationship of matter and energy. Its basic principles are taken up during the year.

Brighton's Junior High requires two years of general mathematics. Basic fundamentals are taught and the student is made to understand clearly the use of numbers in mathematics.

The High School's math department offers one year of general mathematics, two years of algebra, one year of plane geometry, one semester of solid geometry, and one semester of trigonometry. Also, Brighton offers a course in mechanical drawing.

The arithmetic courses are designed to equip the pupils to deal accurately, speedily, and confidently with everyday problems. The algebra is designed to give the pupil thorough practice in problem solving as opposed to mere memorization. The geometry courses are aimed to teach the student to reason logically. The advanced courses aim to prepare the student for further study of mathematical subjects.

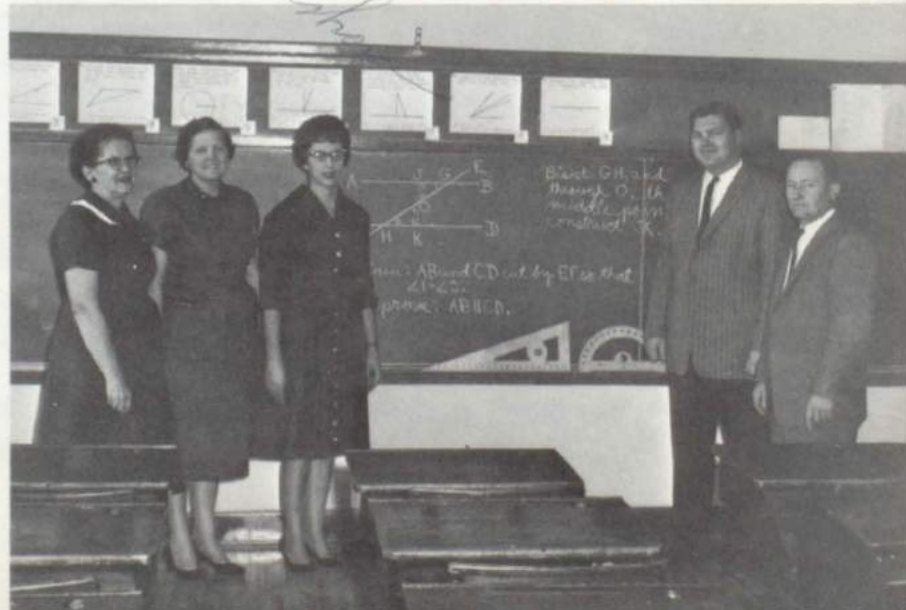

SOCIAL STUDIES

Students of the Junior High are offered two courses in social studies.

Seventh graders studying geography become well aware of the make-up of the world's countries, and their physical features.

Eighth graders must study United States history, in which the formation of our country and its progress is taught.

Three courses in the social studies are taught in High School. Sophomores may take World History which teaches the advancement of civilization, from the beginning of recorded history to the present day.

All Juniors are required to take United States History—the study of our nation from its discovery until the modern day.

As a final requirement in social studies for graduation, Brighton High's Seniors must take American government. Included in this course are the study of federal, state and local government, as well as political and social aspects of good citizenship.

LANGUAGES

The language department of the Junior and Senior High School is teaching students how to comprehend languages, other than English.

Two years of Spanish is now being required in the years of Junior High. A basic and practical approach is used and the student soon is able to comprehend Spanish in a rapid and understanding manner.

Two years of Spanish and two years of Latin are offered to students of High School. These subjects are not required, but are strongly recommended to college-bound students.

In the first years of these languages, the basic principles are taught. In second year Latin, advanced study in Latin and also Roman history are taken up. Second year Spanish rounds out the students training and is designed to give the student a full comprehension of the elements of Spanish grammar and vocabulary.



FINE ARTS

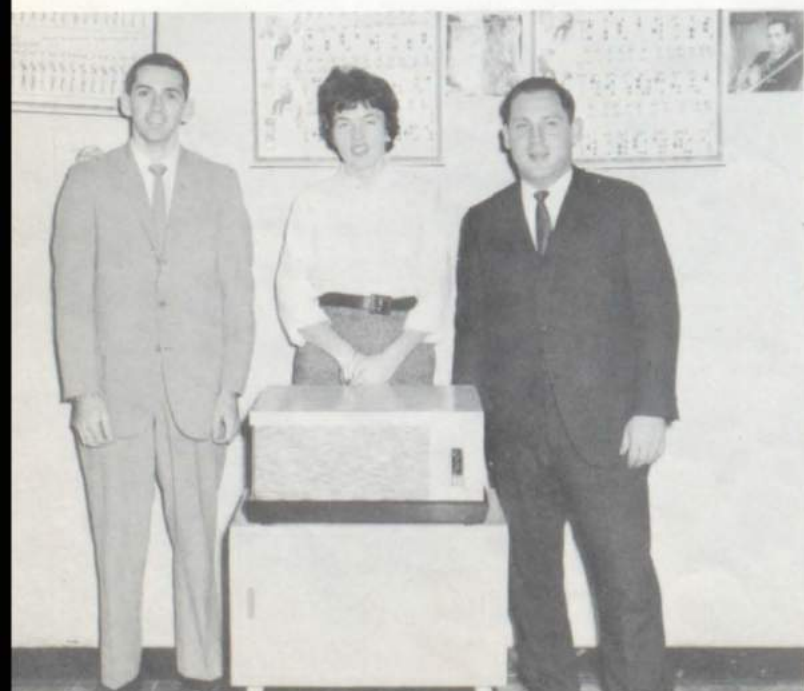
The Fine Arts Department of the Junior and Senior High are made up of instrumental music, under Mr. Klopshinske; Vocal music, under Mr. Mallett; and Art, under Mrs. Odgers.

The purpose of the instrumental department is not necessarily to make musicians of the students, but to teach them an appreciation for music. Students in Junior High may take two years of band, and Senior High students may take four years of band. Included during the year is playing in both the marching and concert bands. A High School instrument class is also offered.

Vocal music in High School may be taken and this branch is made up of the High School Chorus.

Junior High Art class, and Art I and II in High School covers many varied fields in art as possible. The history of art is combined with practical class work to give students a good and general appreciation in art.

vocational

The Vocational Training Program in our school consists of three areas; industrial arts, commercial, and homemaking. Vocational training provides students with training to give them a trade after High School or to be used even in everyday living.

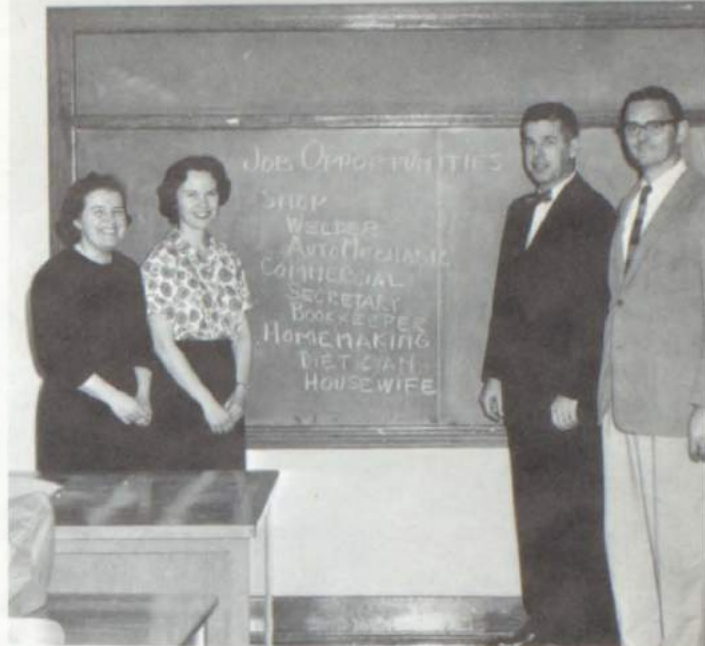
The Industrial Arts department offers four years of shop dealing with hand woodworking, machine woodworking, metal machinery, welding, power mechanics and the basic understanding of steps required to carry out projects starting with ideas and plans.

The Commercial department offers typing, shorthand, office practice, and bookkeeping. These subjects give students training for personal use, to develop skills to procure office positions, and to prepare for more advanced training at business college after graduation. Mr. Etzcorn is the teacher of this department.

The Homemaking department offers four years of homemaking to the High School girls to help them live a more useful and satisfying personal, family and community life. All phases of homemaking are studied including clothing construction and food preparation. Miss Patricia Heyning and Mrs. Hawkins are the teachers.

In the future we hope to have new departments in a new High School with more and better equipment.

The Physical Education department of both the Junior and Senior High Schools provides for the physical well-being of their students.

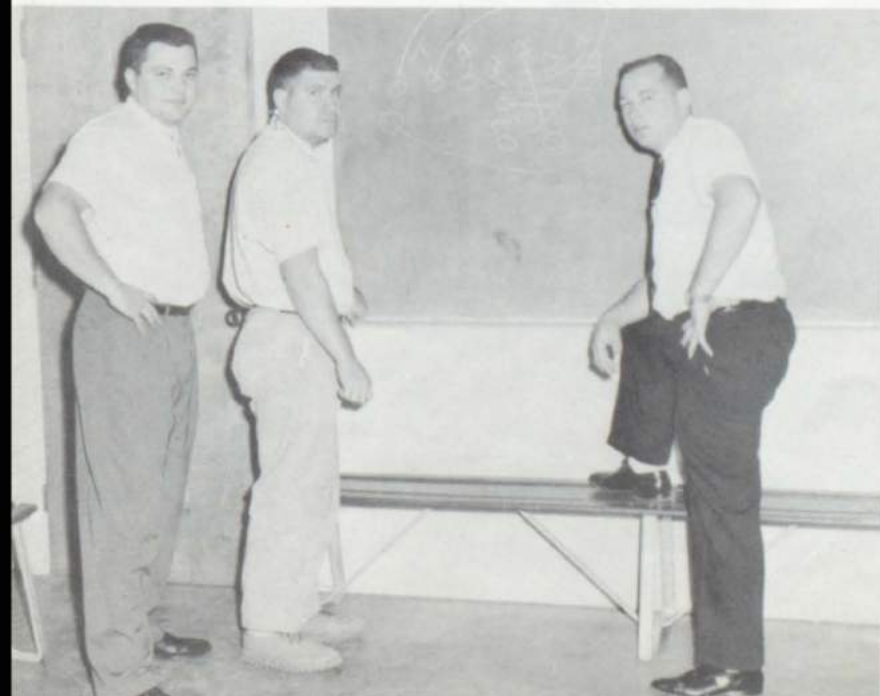
Two years of "gym" are required for all of Brighton High's students.

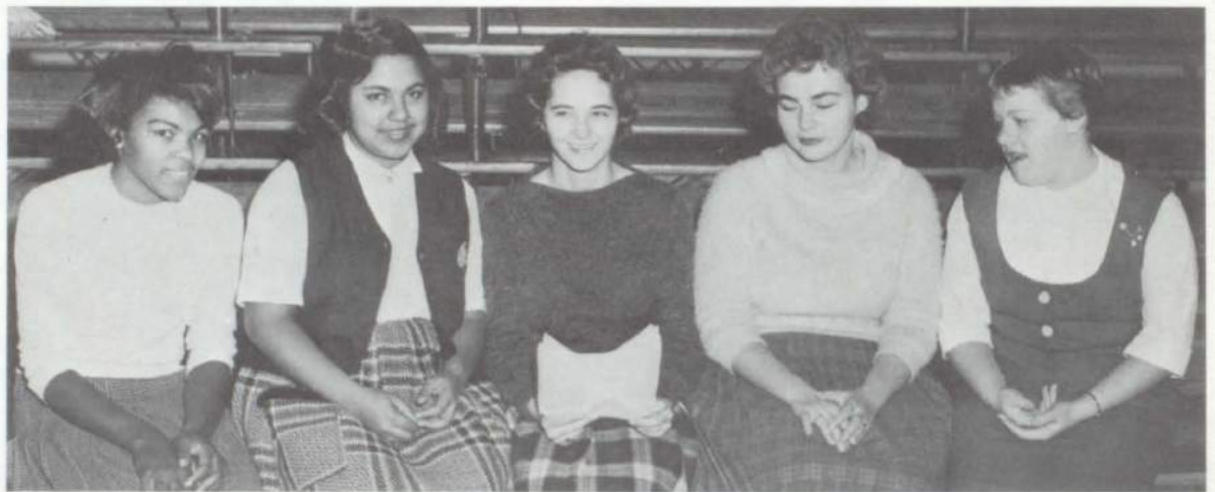

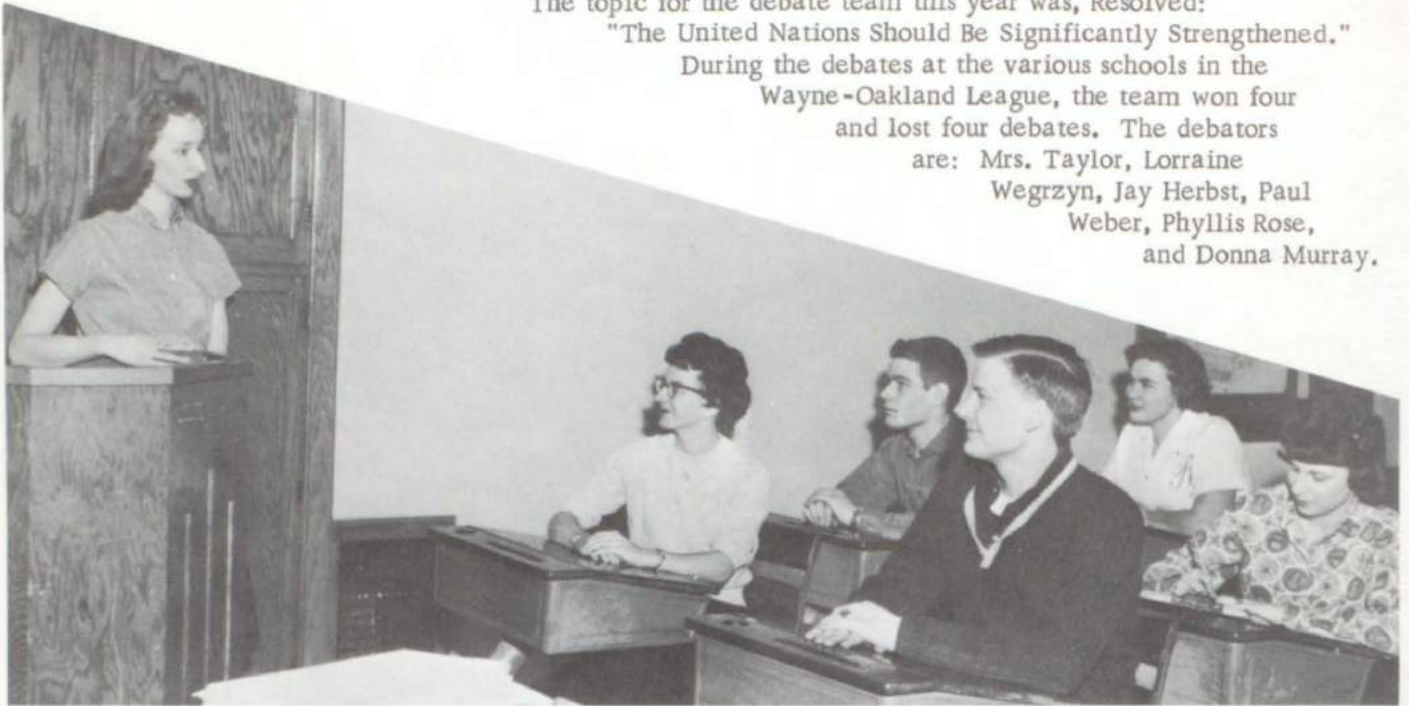

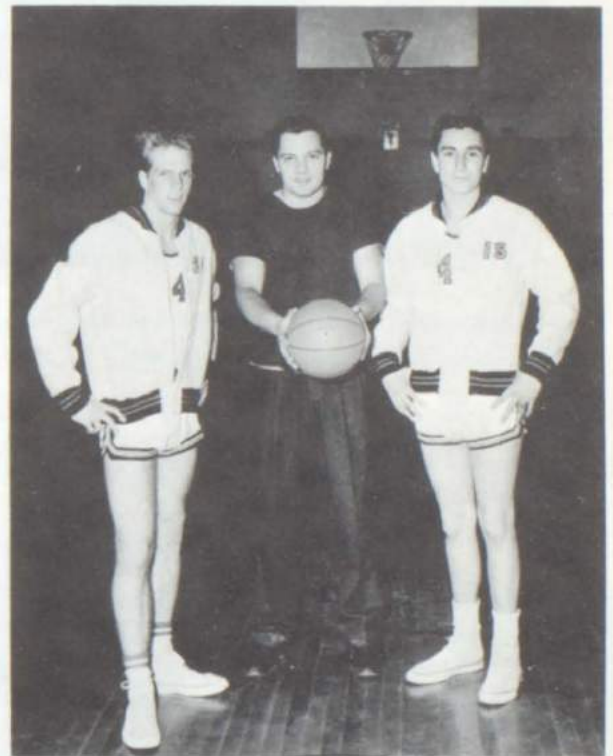

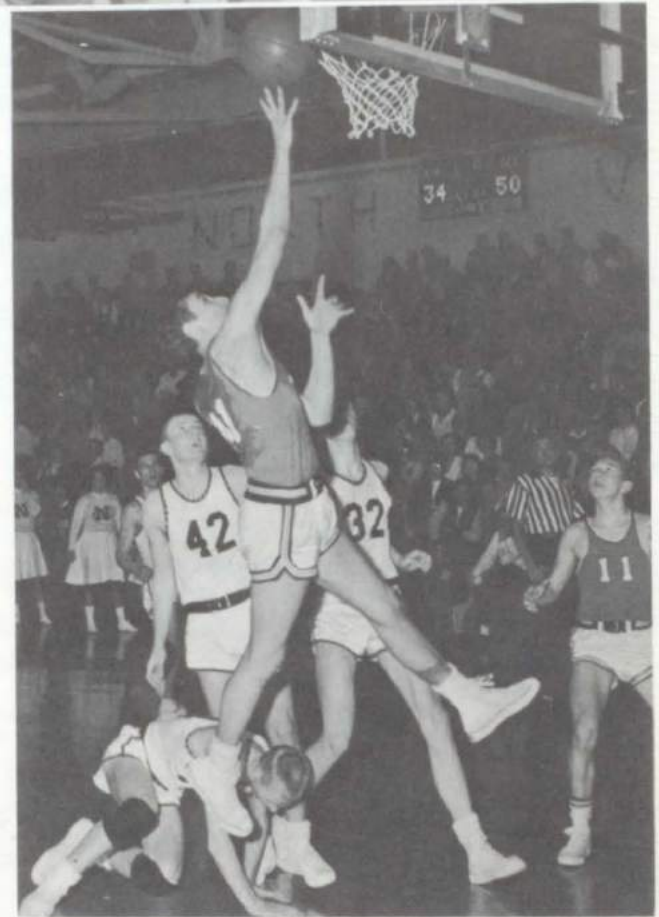

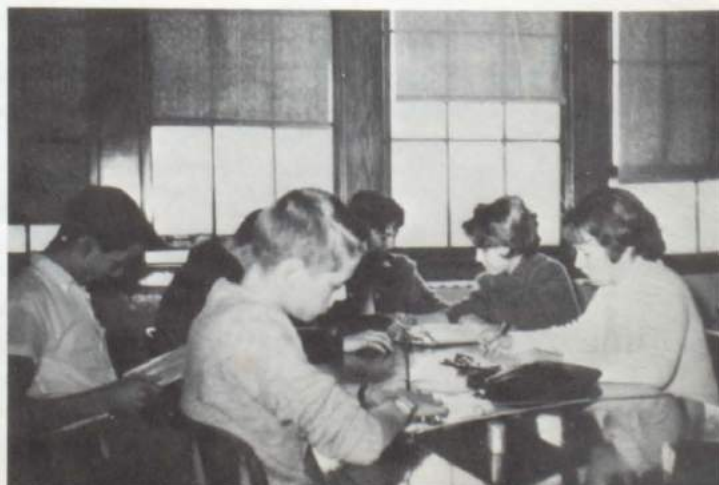
